

## How to Respond to an Overcall.



## Responding to an Overcall.

If at all possible you should support your partner's overcall but try to work out what type of overcall your partner was making.

Your options in responding will be:-

- 1. Pass
- 2. To support your partner
- 3. To bid No Trumps
- 4. To make an overcall of your own
- 5. To respond to a Takeout Double

## 1. If you can't support your partner and have no bid of your own.

#### PASS!


The only exception will be if your partner made a takeout double and the opposition have not bid.

1 🚓	2♥	Pass	Pass


## 2. Supporting your Partner's suit.

Your partner will have at least five cards in the suit they overcalled in.


You need a minimum of three to support them.



With 8-10 HCP and a good quality suit the overcall at the one level shows.



With 11+ HCP and a good quality suit the overcall at the two level shows.



#### Use the Losing Trick Count to determine the level to which you can support.

If you don't use the Losing Trick Count then I strongly recommend that you learn it. It is an invaluable tool in evaluating your hand.

Without the Losing Trick Count then you may wish to use "The Law of Total Tricks".

This says that *usually* the number of tricks won is equal to the number of cards the partnership jointly holds in the trump suit.

To make an overcall then you know that your partner has at least 5 cards in that suit and so if you have 3 then you could *usually* expect to make 8 tricks. In this case you could support up to the two level.

## 3. Bidding No Trumps.

If you had a balanced hand and only two cards in your partner's overcalled suit then you might want to think about a NT bid.

How many points would you need to do this?

If your partner has overcalled at the one level then you can expect them to have 8-10 points ie 4 points fewer than a normal opening bid.

Your 1NT response would need 4 points more and so 10-14 would be needed to make a 1NT reply.


West may have 12-19 HCP, North 8-10 and East less then 6.

If you as South are holding 13 HCP and a balanced hand how does this now look?

North/South have 21-23 HCP leaving East/West with 19-17.

If you have a stopper in the enemy suit then NT looks a very good contract.

Here is an example where N/S could bid and make a 1NT contract.



## 4. Make your own Overcall.

You need a good reason to make your own overcall, think of the post mortem if you get it wrong!

You will need a strong overcalling hand in your own right and the best reason would be if you can overcall a major suit over your partner's minor.

If your partner has overcalled at the two level then you will need an exceptional hand to bid an alternative suit!


## 5. Respond to a Takeout Double.

#### Doubles

Modern Acol teaches that a double of the opposition's opening bid is a Takeout double it is not for penalties.

The double should mean:


- o Enough points to open
- o A shortage in the opponent's bid suit.
- Ability to support any suit that your partner bids.




North's double is asking South to show their best suit.
